A few paragraphs cannot express fully my gratitude and delight in finding Thomas Merton. My friends often ask me about 'my monk' — and I look forward to the day when I will be queuing up with thousands of others to greet him in heavenly places and to thank him for his love and friendship, for he has taken me to heavenly places indeed.
